

#### FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK



It is an honor and a privilege to be greeting you as the newly-elected President of our PCA. I hope I can serve you well in this term.

How did you get started in collecting Plastic ville or other plastic villages? I'll bet that my story has a lot of similarities with other plastic village

collectors, maybe yours. My story has a few twists and turns. Early memories are distant, but I remember playing with a Marx windup set, and then around age 5 my grandfather gave me my first real O gauge train for Christmas: a Kusan freight set! Only the engine and track have survived from that set, but I also remember playing with a few Plasticville pieces: a Motel, a Suburban Station, and a Fire House. Unfortunately, my parents saw fit to give them away to another kid who got a Lionel train for Christmas a few years later.

I still had a connection to Plasticville though, because my father's Christmas trains, and eventually mine, were HO, and we had a good collection of Plasticville buildings. They eventually went into storage during college, marriage, early career, etc. But I was beginning to become aware of vintage trains, and started a small collection of American Flyer S gauge. Then it happened. Living on Long Island, I walked into TrainLand one day. Now in the middle of the store was a huge table, maybe 8'x8' or more, always piled with old train stuff that obviously came into the store. They even had a deal: \$10 to fill a paper grocery bag with anything you wanted. On a previous trip I had scored a bag loaded to the top with Flyer cabooses, almost every variation available. On this particular day, some familiar buildings caught my eye; I even remember the cashier gave me the eye because I had stuff sticking out of the bag as high as it would go as I checked out. But I went home the owner a huge lot of Plasticville O/S buildings.

There's more to my story, and I'll continue in later newsletters. For now just let me add that my curiosity, along with the knowledge shared by others like you, has kept me interested in this hobby for over thirty years. Like many of you, I joined the PCA not for what I knew but for what I hoped I could learn. And that leads me to one of the main things I hope we can do together: continue to make the PCA the go-to organization for everything Plasticville and, as a bonus, all plastic villages. I have just completed my first executive meeting, and we spent almost the whole time on things that will make our website even better.

Now a confession: I have a personal passion for those special edition buildings that were made for PCA anniversaries. #### **INCOMING VICE-PRESIDENT'S REPORT**



First and foremost I want to thank the membership for electing me the Vice-President of the PCA. I was both blind-sided and flattered that our Secretary approached me to consider running for office. I will try to contribute to the organization to the best of my ability.

My wife and I just relocated to Lititz, PA back in October, so because of the move, my 200 square foot Lionel O Gauge layout in Denver, CO, was totally disassembled and carefully packed. As a result of the move, I was able to better organize all of my "stuff". I didn't realize how much Plasticville I have! I am now starting to build a 300+ square foot layout, but so far all I'm doing is building the table for the layout. I plan to use quite a bit more of my scenery structures than I used before. This is probably a multi-year project for me, but I enjoy the challenge and the creativity of designing a new layout, including the scenery.

I hope that everybody had a joyous and memorable holiday season and that someone presented you with a gift that is Plasticville or model/toy train related. My wife surprised me with "The Depot" train station which is one of the newer buildings put out by Woodland Scenics. This one, like all of the others that I presently own, is painted, weathered, and detailed with the greatest precision that I could never duplicate on my own. Although I am a big fan of Plasticville, I also enjoy structures that are available from other manufacturers as well. I am constantly frustrated that there haven't been any new O scale buildings presented by Plasticville, but on the other hand, I am very pleased that the O Scale line is still alive out there, and that Bachmann is presenting their product pre-painted with again greater precision than I could produce. I particularly admire the paint scheme for the Bank and the Farmer's Market. I have to admit right now that I know very little about the HO line of Plasticville. I do know that there are a few Plasticville structures available in the HO line that are not available in the O scale. I wish that it wasn't the case.

I realized quite a few years ago, that I am more interested in the scenery portion of my Lionel train layout than the trains themselves. When I was a teenager, I would try to visualize what a big village of Plasticville would look like even though I didn't have

the money to buy all of the buildings, or the size of my layout to put them on. It was an ongoing exercise with trying to figure out how to realistically design and relate the airport structures with the farm buildings and the turnpike toll booths. Add in the Independence Hall, and that made the challenge for me even harder.

I am by no means an expert on Plasticville although I've spent a reasonable amount of time researching and getting knowledgeable with all of the different color variations for all of the various structures. It was about ten years ago at a TCA York train show when I took the step of purchasing a large box of assorted Plasticville parts with the intention of continuing to search for the random pieces that would be needed to complete the various structures with the proper colors. Some of the structures came fairly easy, but most of them turned out to be a lot harder than I expected. There is quite a lot of Plasticville being shown at the York shows, and if you have never attended one, you will be overwhelmed at the physical size of the show, and all that is available to buy if you are so inclined. Of course, you have to be a member of the TCA to attend.

I know that some of the membership are much more knowledgeable about the Plasticville line than I am because of the articles that they submit for our newsletter. I always enjoy reading their articles about researching different issues and kit-bashing different parts to come up with an original structure. I certainly encourage our members to continue sharing your creativity with all of us who deal with any subject that is scenery related.

Because this is my first newsletter appearance, and I am new to the office, I'm not yet up to speed as to what the current issues and concerns behind the scenes (no pun intended) of this organization may be. As we move forward, I'll share them with the membership. I will also share some of the knowledge that I discovered about Plasticville, various scenery techniques and other tricks about lighting structures and also installing those wonderful Miller Engineering signs that I enjoy using.

#### **NOTES FROM THE SECRETARY**



The votes have been counted. Congratulations go to Chris Matthy and Frank Ross. They are our new President and Vice President, respectively, for 2016 and 2017. Their willingness to step up and help lead this organization is greatly appreciated by me as well as the outgoing officers.

It seems that I will be your Secretary/Treasurer for the next two years as no one ran against me. I hope that someone will step up and accept this position during the next election cycle. I enjoy the work but spend quite a few hours each week on the associated tasks as well as administer *The Parts Bin* program. In addition, I have an extensive collection of Plasticville and other plastic village buildings that I would like to photograph for inclusion on our website. This, coupled with a vision issue, may prevent me from continuing as your Secretary/Treasurer after 2017.

One of those tasks is member retention. I have, historically, contacted every member who has not renewed membership after January 1 to determine why they have not done so. I will then send an invoice and coordinate new advertising copy where applicable. I will not put you into this position "cold" but would take you around to all of our advertisers at the next Fall York and introduce you to each advertiser as their new advertising contact. S. copyright laws therefore the seller was breaking the law. Fortunately, the seller removed the listing from eBay after I contacted him.

As you read on the front page, our website developer has added a Login option to the menu bar. This should make it a lot easier for you to get to the Members section of the website. We should have asked for this option some time ago. I tried it and I love it.

This year has been a banner year for returned mail. Most was returned due because the time that the USPS will forward mail had expired. In other cases the returned mail label states the premises was vacant. When I receive returned mail I try my best to contact the person to whom the mail was sent. Your membership information is safe in that respect as well as electronically. Your information is stored on a computer that has intrusion prevention as well as a dual firewall to help prevent intrusion.

#### **JANUARY 2015 EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES**

The January Executive Committee meeting was called to order on January 7, 2016 at 7:00PM, Eastern Standard time, by founder Joe Kutza. Those in attendance were founder Joe Kutza, incoming President Chris Matthy, incoming Vice President Frank Ross, Immediate Past President Doug Gilliatt, Immediate Past Vice President Fred Ruby, and website developer Doty Shepard. Those in absence were outgoing Immediate Past President James Dawes and Secretary/Treasurer John Niehaus.

(NOTE: The following minutes were constructed based on a telephone conversation with Joe Kutza after the meeting concluded)

The business portion of the meeting was prefaced by a welcoming of the new officers by Joe Kutza and Fred Ruby.

#### Old Business:

#### Search for new Internet Service provider

A discussion was held after which a motion was made, seconded and unanimously approved to move forward with the transitioning from our current Internet Service Provider (ISP) to Blue Host as recommended by Doty. Doty reported that hosting through Blue Host would be about half the price of the current ISP as well as allowing more storage space than the current ISP at the lower cost.

Joe asked Doty to put together a transition plan for the Committee's review and approval.

A second motion was made, seconded, and unanimously approved to transition from the current domain name service, register.com, for economical as well as service issues associated with register.com.

#### Lack of the physical address of the PCA on the website

It was suggested by Doty that a physical address not be included on the website due to the possibility of opening the person at that physical address up to junk mail and registration hoaxes similar to what she experienced when she was temporarily hosting the new site on her server.

#### Continued use of PVUSA and PV

A discussion was held regarding continuing the use of both domain names, those being plasticville.org and plasticvilleusa.org. A motion was made, seconded and unanimously approved to continue to pay for the right to use both names at this time. This was predicated on the fact that the plasticvilleusa.org domain name is used on the current website and to change to the plasticville.org domain name would be cost prohibitive. The decision to retain both was to ensure that the plasticville.org domain name was not used by another entity that may in no manner be connected with the Plasticville trade name of the PCA.

#### Membership record information change

Doty will investigate the feasibility of allowing members to directly change information in their membership record rather than sending an email or letter to the Secretary. She will investigate the feasibility as well as the cost for this option during her transitioning process to Blue Host as the PCA's ISP.

#### Password retrieval

It was requested of Doty that she investigate the possibility of members retrieving their password electronically rather than sending an email to the Secretary. She will investigate the feasibility as well as the cost for this option during her transitioning process to Blue Host as the PCA's ISP.

#### DID YOU EVER NOTICE: THOSE LARGE BIRDS

ecently, I have taken an interest in the Bachman Brothers bird baths with the single large bird (shown below) and did some research to learn about their history. I acquired the bird baths about 20 years ago in a collection of Plasticville. I



had traded "sold out Cleveland Indians tickets" to a supervisor at work for Plasticville buildings. They were common buildings

and the trades were fair although I did not realize that there were three different colored bird baths with those large birds nor did I understand their status. Several years ago after going through my collection several times I started to question these bird baths. I sent an E-mail to Bill Nole asking him about these items. He said that they were hard-to-find and were released in a birthday cake offerings but never in the Plasticville line. They are under BB logo but not part of the train type kits. Another offshoot of Bachmann just like the sunglasses line.


I had to know more about the history and value. I did some searching and found that after World War II, Bachmann was



experimenting with plastic injection molding. Some of the first items

they started manufacturing were combs, sunglasses and birthday cake BIRD candle holders. The candle holders examples are shown above with about 5 different color variations. Additional colors were offered at the time. The Bachmann candle holders have a hole in the top for the candle and a stick so that they stand up in the cake. When this large bird was used in the bird bath the cavity in the mold was filled to cover the hole in the large bird (as shown in the first photo).

The next photo shows the underside of the bird bath. The bath with the large bird is on the left and a regular 2-bird bath is on the right. Notice how the "stick" of the large bird is glued to the



bottom of the bird bath. These products (with the large birds) were part of the BB line and produced between 1947 and 1949. The large birds with the bath would come in three colors: light blue, yellow, and red. The more common 2-bird Plasticville version, produced in 1950, would come in these same colors.

Three years ago I could not find any values for these birds because I would never see any listings for them on eBay nor any published values simply because they were not part of the Plasticville line. Recently, I saw a few birds sell individually on eBay for between \$40.00 and \$50.00 with shipping. One of sellers claimed the light blue bird is the rarest.

The Plasticville bird bath is cataloged as Bird Bath/Garden Bird Bath CBR/CB and is shown to the right. This Bird bath is one of the first Plasticville items produced. It is interesting to note that the HF-2 Fence and



Gate Kit dealer box shows a bird bath on the front of it, it has the single large bird. The Fence & Gate Kit was produced in 1950. The cover of the HF-2 box is shown below. Notice the bird bath in the front right side of the yard.






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#### K-LINE: BOXES, BAGS, AND BLISTERPACKS

#### Box Type 5

The box I have identified as Box 5 is most unusual. In fact it is so unusual that I personally have never seen one however they do come up for sale on eBay from time to time. But never at a price I am willing to pay, so for me the search goes on! The photos which accompany this article are used with the kind permission of Ed Berg. The box seems to be strange mixture of the next logical progression of Box 4 combined with features of Box 1.



The left portion of the front of the box appears to be the next logical progression of Box 4. The upper left corner of the box has the now familiar K-LINE ELECTRIC TRAINS logo. In the lower left corner of the box the text now reads, "For use with all K-LINE, Lionel and other O Scale layouts" As noted in the previous article about Box 4, K-Line had dropped the reference to Lionel in their text however it now returns! Curiously also the logo/text now takes up a larger percentage of the front of the box, 40%, compared to 33% previously. This is to the detriment of the photo which takes up the rest of the front of the box. On Box 5 this photo is not of the item included in the box but is a printed photo of K-LINEVILLE previously seen on Box 1. And there is a small sticker affixed to the upper corner of the front of the box which extends down over the right side of the box which identifies the item included in the box, also identical to that seen on Box 1. Perhaps this was a generic "emergency" box which could be used to package any item if the supply of pre-printed boxes ran out. A quick printing of some stickers and you are back in business.

Of special note, the only item I have seen packaged in this box is K-4177 High Tension Poles (10). K-4177 was cataloged from 1983-1987 and was dropped from the catalog in 1988. It stands to reason that this box was made in 1987 as this coincides with the new K-Line logo used in 1987. I would be interested in hearing of any other items which came in this box.

This box is certainly unusual and for the sake of completeness the highlights/details of the box are as follows. These are items that change as the boxes change:

- The box has a white background.
- The newer round K-LINE ELECTRIC TRAINS logo is printed in the upper left corner of the front of the box. The locomotive is blue and yellow. This logo is the same as that appearing on the front cover of the 1987 catalog.
- On the lower left portion of the box front the item is described as being a "Full O Scale Building Kit/"For use with all K-LINE, Lionel and other O Scale layouts/Easy to assemble/Snap fit assembly/Pre-colored parts/Realistic detailing". The reference to Lionel has returned.
- The logo/text portion on the left side of the front is a larger percentage: 40%.
- There is a picture of K-Lineville printed on the right 60% of the front of the box, identical to that on Box 1.
- There is a small sticker with a photo of the item included in the box affixed to the upper corner of the front of the box and extends down over the right side of the box. A description of the item is included on the sticker.
- The right side of the box has the newer K-LINE ELECTRIC
  TRAINS logo printed on the left third of the side. The
  aforementioned sticker extends down over the right twothirds and has the item description as well as the item number.




 The left side of the box has a small photo of K-LINEVIILE along with the newer K-LINE ELECTRIC TRAINS logo, identical to Box 4.

- There is no mention of a country of origin, therefore it can be assumed that these items were manufactured in the U.S.

back of the box. The church is <u>still</u> listed as 4110 Church even though the 4110 Church had been superseded by the 4111 Church in the 1983 catalog.

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#### **GREENBERG'S 2016 LIONEL POCKET PRICE GUIDE**

he Lionel Greenberg's pocket price guide for 2016 is now available from Kalmbach books. Kalmbach only published a Lionel guide this year, no new American Flyer or Marx guides. My guess is that there may not be a large enough market for them to publish a volume every year or even every other year although the last Marx guide was published in 2011.

The new Lionel guide is over ¾ inch thick. It contains the same seven sections as did the 2015 edition. It can still be called a pocket price guide as it will still fit into the back pocket of a pair of blue jeans. Still missing in this year's guide are the black section markings on the edges of the pages. That is a shame as it did make getting to a specific section of the guide quicker and easier.


Let's see how the prices fared, compared to last year, for the ten pieces of Lionel that I have tracked since 2007. It is my feeling that the market is relatively stable. Most values remained the same or changed minimally. There were two exceptions.

The 2343 AA units increased in price by \$20 in Good condition but dropped by \$6 in Excellent condition, with their values being listed at \$175 and \$465 for Good and Excellent condition respectively. The 2343 B unit, type B, lost value in both Good and Excellent condition. It is now listed at \$95 in Good condition - an \$11 drop from last year and at \$190 - an \$82 drop from last year in Excellent condition.

The five stripe, 2360 Tuscan GG1 and the green 2360 GG1 maintained or lost \$1 or \$2 in value over their 2015 values with one exception. The Tuscan unit increased in value by \$2.

The 746 with long stripe tender rebounded from last year, almost beating the 2014 guide's values. It increased from \$501 to \$520 in Good condition. The Excellent value increased by \$66 to \$940.

Every other piece that I track, regardless of whether they are pre-war, postwar, or modern, either gained or lost \$1 or \$2 or



retained the same values as last year regardless of condition. Thus my previous statement that the market is stable. It will be interesting to see what the market does in the coming year.

Plasticville made three styles of homes with attached garages, Littletown and Skyline made one each. I'm not sure whether Lionel, Marx or any other companies made homes with attached garages. Among the many structures on my home layout are three MTH homes. Being cast in a residential setting I felt that there was something missing, garages.

As is the case of many kitbashers, and as I pointed out in other articles, "NEVER" throw away any structural parts with removable doors or windows. I'm getting too old, too shaky, too cranky, and definitely too impatient to construct them. Bah Humbug fits the season and the reasons for not having that type of frustration. It is one task that I don't really wish to make time for.

Call me a hoarder but I have a lot of broken PV parts (I did not break them). Among the broken structures were a Couple PV tri-level homes, parts were used for the two door, two car version. For the others, roofs from the parish church and a two story colonial were used. Although not used, for those who prefer a more scale look, the New England rancher has the best detailed roof of "any" PV structure. In spite of its assembly short comings, it is one of my favorite PV houses. Plasticville windows, doors, roofs, a package of lap board siding and right angle strips are the main construction ingredients. I also used some miscellaneous scrap plastic for a base material, wood could also be used. I tried to match the paint colors as close as possible to the MTH houses.

I don't know who manufactured the garages in the last two pictures. One was enhanced with a PV door, PV windows and paint.















#### K-LINE KRONICLES

#### Diner

#### ED BERG #02-123



I'm a bit of a diner nut, having plastic, tin, and ceramic diners in my collection and the Marx/K-Line diner is a fine example of the type found throughout the country – primarily in the east. It has a lot of character for a small building and it doesn't take up a lot of train layout real estate and so is easy enough to find a home for on even the smallest of layouts.

The holidays have been rather hectic and so this article is kind of short-&-sweet. Today we'll get a quick glimpse at K-Line's earliest diner. K-Line's earliest diners were silver and red just like the Marx originals, however, while the K-Line 'silver' is a dull and muted gray like that of a time-worn patina the Marx diner can be compared to the shiny stainless steel of a new building with a distinct 'swirl' in the plastic. When you think of it, that's rather appropriate as Marx came out with theirs first and so deserved a nice, shiny new look!



Shown below is the side, K-Line is on the left and Marx is on the right,



Wherever there is shrubbery present, whether it be on the diner or on houses, school house, etc., the Marx shrubbery is a light green, K-Line, a dark green. This can be seen in the photo on the right. Marx is in the foreground and K-Line is in the back.



There is no molded-in logo on the K-line piece, instead a peel & stick roof sign 'K-LINEVILLE DINER' with silver letters on red background, is included. Marx of course hand the separately molded "MARXVILLE DINER" sign.

Five unpainted figures in beige/tan hard plastic were included: man in overalls, girl jumping rope, boy roller skating, woman standing with a small child, and a milkman. The figures can been seen standing in front of the diner in the photo on the top right.

For interior detail, Marx molded figures on the inside of the "windows" with the intent that, when lit from inside, one could see the figures' silhouette's. Only three different patterns were used.

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#### **ALONG THE HO LINE**

#### Kits Packaged in One Color?





Tello everyone, I'd like to send my wishes for a good New Year to all. I know we can use it! With the way the year has started, it would seem we would have no other way to go but up. Let's hope so.

In this offering I would like to show more of my, latest, eBay finds. What I have added to my collection are a couple of kits that are all grey. There are two Switch Towers and a later Coaling Tower. It is the Coaling Tower that has me wondering if it was done when packaged. I know that I also picked up an earlier Coaling Tower in all brown but I could not find it! So, I'll stick to the grey kits.

Now I don't know what the chances are of Bachmann actually doing this. Still, it was intriguing to me. Did Bachmann package kits in one color and not the usual two colors? Was there a chance that left over parts in the same color were used and packaged for sale? Why not? I'm sure good pieces were not discarded. Why would a complete kit appear on eBay in just one color?

The two examples I have to show are both Railroad Buildings. I picked up a 2619-100 Switch Tower kit that had two Towers in an all grey color. The stairs, doors, chimneys and platforms were brown. It is the walls and roofs of both kits that are all grey. As we all know, these buildings are commonly found molded in brown and grey. They are also easily found in opposite versions where the colors of the kits are swapped. If there is a grey body



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it will have a brown roof. Or a brown body would have the grey roof etc.

What attracted me to this particular listing was the fact that there were two identical Towers in the one 2619-100 box. They were

each in their own plastic bag. Both bags were the same. Both bags were opened at the end. The bags were identical to bags I have in other kits. Along with the parts, to the two towers, were accesso-



ries for each kit. There were two figures, two barrels and two signals with red and green lenses to be installed. So, there are two kits, complete in one box and the bodies and roofs are one color. What are the odds that these kits are the same and were not done on purpose? The seller was not a train enthusiast. If he were, he may have been just as curious as I was and made mention of the odd kit. That he didn't list the kit as an oddity tells me he thought it should be this way.

The second kit I came across in a 2808 Coaling Station. This one is even more unusual. It is all grey. There are no other colors packaged in the box. There are no brown parts! There is one sprue left and it has the two platforms still attached. The assembly directions sheet is also present. Again, I'm left to wonder if this is also done purposely. It just looks too perfect for it not to be.

So, that is it for this Villager article. If there are any opinions, don't hesitate to offer them. I'd like to know what others think. I'd like to know if anyone else has anything similar in their collection. If you do, please share. Thanks again and see you next time.

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
#### Pizza Place

reetings fellow travelers through the world of *Plasticville*, hope you had a happy holidays. Once again my supply of parts is almost depleted. There were only two useable parts left.

Half of a fire house roof and the back piece to the small store. The small store piece had been cut apart for a project that didn't materialize. What to do with these parts? After some positioning it seemed these parts could be made into a small store. What kind of store? Several designs were considered. Eventually an idea for a small pizza place seemed to work. The design is to place the model against another building. These are the only *Plasticville* parts the rest of the model would be constructed with wood and cardstock.



The model is under construction. The back wall is constructed with basswood. One side wall is constructed from the part with two windows. The other side used the remaining part and a piece of basswood. The back wall is covered with brick paper and an overlay<sup>†</sup>. The floor is balsawood covered with a printed wood pattern. The toilet room is installed in the corner. In the foreground there is the clear door from the factory to be used as the entrance, a *Lego* part, it will become a pizza oven and a part from an unknown source for the front window.



This photo shows the progress for detailing the interior. All of the details are made from cardstock and basswood. The previously mentioned *Lego* part is built up to be the pizza oven. It is covered with brick paper. The dark material above it is the beginning of a chimney. There is a partition between the working area and the eating area. Also a small serving counter next to

the oven. It's not quite visible in this photo but there is a shelf over the sink.



The brick covered part lying down will become the facade front of the store. There is some more interior detail to added. The next installment will show this model ready for business.

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
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

#### **PRODUCT REVIEWS**

#### JOHN L. NIEHAUS #00-3

he Art of the Locomotive, Ken Boyd, 193 pages, hardcover, 11½ × 9½, \$50. Published by Voyageur Press. Color and black & white photos throughout.

I was intrigued by the title of this book when I received it for review. The dustcover showed not only the book's title and author but an early B&O 4-6-0 steam engine. I presumed that the book would discuss and illustrate the early steam engines and the penchant for decorating these engines with color, various metals, and unique names. My presumption was way off base.

This book is a compilation of photographs by the author. What sets these photos apart is that they were taken with a digital camera. "So what? I have a digital camera too!" you may say. The second part is that the author has digitally enhanced his photos to better represent their subjects.

The author explains in the introduction to this book that he is not only a photographer but also a digital artist. He states that his photography today, "typically includes a high quality camera or two, a few good lenses, a sturdy tripod, and plenty of digital media".

In some of his photos he has removed all background images and placed the locomotive on a white background. In other

how Trains of the 20th Century, Fred Dahlinger Jr., 126 pages, soft back,  $10\frac{1}{4} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$ , \$29.95. Black and white photos throughout. Published by Iconografix through its Enthusiast Books division.

Just viewing the cover of this book piqued my interest. The preface to the title on the front cover read, "Circus World Museum presents". My initial impression was that this book would contain photos of the multitude of traveling circuses that I remember as a youngster. I was wrong.

The illustration on the cover is an artist's rendering of the unloading of the Johnny J Jones carnival train. Not a circus train. Yes, Johnny J Jones did exist per a quick Google search.

There is a three page introduction that also includes the usual acknowledging of those who helped make the book a possibility. Oddly enough there are no chapters. One merely dives into the photos and their captions starting on page 7.

The term show train is somewhat vague as to what would constitute such an entity. The author does an excellent job of covering the various trains in this category. He includes photos of well known show trains such as Buffalo Bill's Wild West Shows and Barnum & Bailey's circus trains. He also has included lesser know shows such as Pawnee Bill's Wild West Shows and Colonel Cummins Indian Congress. There are photos of a traveling firefighting show, a traveling theater troupe, and a minstrel band, just to name a few.

The average size of the photos is 5 by 9 inches. Each has a highly informative caption. In some instances the caption relates to the

instances he has replaced only the sky with a more pleasing image. There are instances where background images are upsized. In one photo of the Union Pacific Big Boy number 4012 he superimposed a second image of the locomotive on the photo to give both a



quarter view as well as a nearly full frontal view. Some of the photos have even been changed from color to black and white.

This is a unique book of which I know of no others that are digitally enhanced photos. I enjoyed viewing the photos and reading the captions. In many instances the pieces being photographed are in such an area that only by the author's enhancement of his photos can we truly see the beauty of the pieces.

Their site contains links to various online retailers in both the U.S. and the U.K. I found it on Barnes & Noble's website in hardcover format at \$34.70 and in Nook format at \$28.99. Amazon's website offered it in hardcover at \$23.27.

In most cases the caption also lists the date of the photo and its provenance. The photos are for the most part presented in chronological order by date and range from 1895 to 1970.


I enjoyed reading the book and now have a trivia question, based on the caption of one of the photos in the book, that I will pose to you.

The question: How were horses loaded into the stock cars so that they would not fall over during abrupt changes in train motion?

The answer: They were packed in solid, facing the side of the car and from one end of the car to the other. I doubt that practice would be approved today.

I did not find this book listed on the Enthusiast Books website. I am presuming that it has been removed due to it being out of stock and that it will be added back when a new supply is

available. It is listed on Amazon's website for \$23.44 but a bit of sleuthing showed one company offering it for \$14.46. It is listed at \$18.14 on Barnes & Noble's website but through their Marketplace option. Not directly from Barnes & Noble.



urder & Mayhem on Ohio's Rails, Jane Ann Turzillo, 126 pages. Softbound,  $6 \times 9$  format, \$19.99. Published by The History Press. In a nutshell, this is a compilation of ten short historical narratives related to train robberies and murders perpetrated against various railroads with an Ohio connection.

People most generally think of train robberies as being something related to the Old West as portrayed in many movies. One would rarely think of train robberies in Ohio or other Eastern States. This book was written to bring to light in one volume a few of the more interesting, bizarre, or brutal robberies. The author even makes a case for the very first train robbery, occurring shortly after the Civil War, to one in Ohio. (Ohio & Mississippi). The length of stories range from six to 20 pages. They are in a chronological order. Each chapter has black and white photos related to the story. I believe I counted at least five different railroads as being victims of the robberies.




The first robbery was against the Ohio & Mississippi railroad on May 5, 1865. This is the robbery that the author makes a case for as being the first train robbery as it was five years before the first western train robbery. This was a robbery in which no one was physically hurt. Only valuables that the passengers could not hide from the bandits as well as money in the express car was taken.

Other robberies were more disastrous, especially for the expressmen riding with the safes in the express car. In one instance the

There are times when a book will appear on my doorstep that is not plastic village related or related to trains be they prototype or models. This book is one of those instances. This book was included with two other books that were train related.

This book is one of nearly a dozen by the author related to trucks. It begins with a dedication and the usual acknowledgements and an introduction. The author decided to forego the usual lengthy photo attributions. Instead the photo attributions list combinations of letters such as AACA (Antique Auto Club of America) and AC (author's collection) following the captions. I found this unique and quite pleasant since there are times when photo attributions in other books are almost a long at the caption.



There are six chapters in this book. The first three chapters are a chronology of sorts in that they begin with the rationale for using vehicles as opposed to horses and progress up to 1914 when Reo introduced a truck it called a Speed Wagon. Chapter 4 was extremely interesting to me as it discusses the trucks designed for house to house delivery marketed by Divco, White, and others. Seeing photos of the Divco trucks brought me back

expressman allowed a former expressman who had been recently fired to ride in the express car. This was against company rules but was quite often overlooked. Sadly the expressman was murdered for the money in the safe.

The last Story relates how Alvin "creepy" Karpis carried out what the author titles as the last great train robbery in 1935. I am presuming that she is referring to train robberies with an Ohio connection. Karpis was named Public Enemy Number One by Herbert Hoover, replacing Doc Barker in 1935. This is one of the longer stories and goes into quite a bit of detail as to how Karpis planned for months how to pull off the robbery. Incidentally, Karpis was not a US citizen, but a Canadian.

The author has done a good job of researching some robberies that took place over 100 years ago. It is easy to read as the facts are presented with minimal embellishment. It is a unique book in that I have not seen a compendium of train robberies associated with a specific locale before. I enjoyed reading the book and believe you may also.

Murder & Mayhem on Ohio's Rails can be purchased directly from The History Press. I also noticed that on the back of the very last page in the book that it is also available from them as an e-book. Barnes & Noble's website lists the book at \$15.99 as well as it in Nook format for \$9.99. The same prices are listed on Amazon's website for the hard copy book or in Kindle format respectively.



memories of my childhood neighborhood as there was an individual in my neighborhood who drove a Divco on a daily basis delivering milk.

Chapter five discusses larger trucks but with capacities no greater than about 3 tons. Chapter six is a photo gallery of various custom built bodies installed on various truck by Boyertown Auto Body Works of Boyertown, Pennsylvania. A brief Google search revealed that the company was in business from 1872 until sometime in 1990 and that the Boyertown museum is in the former main factory building.

Although not train related I enjoyed reading the book and picking up small tidbits of knowledge such as Graham Brothers was a division of Dodge Brothers. It is also a great reference if one wishes to model delivery trucks between 1900 through about 1953 and need representative graphics from those years.

An Illustrated History of the American Delivery Truck, is available on the Amazon website for \$26.86. It is also listed on Barnes & Noble's website with a price of \$27.11. It does not seem to be listed on Enthusiast Books' website at the present time.


