The Plasticville Collectors Association Incorporates

It has long been in the mind of Joe Kutza to make the Plasticville Collectors Association something more than a website, discussion group and virtual organization. Joe's thoughts were similar to those of other virtual club members who were familiar with other hobby/collecting organizations such as the Train Collectors Association and the Toy Train Operators Society. Joe's thoughts have now become a reality.

The Plasticville Collectors Association has become a non-profit corporation in the State of Iowa.

The certificate of incorporation was

received from the Iowa Secretary of State in early September bearing the date of August 30, 2001. The PCA also has a signed licensing agreement with Bachmann. This agreement authorizes the PCA to use the Plasticville name as part of the Association name.

The last step will be to make the Plasticville Collectors Association a Federal 501c3 non-profit organization. The necessary papers have been received by the PCA and are in the process of being completed and submitted for approval.

One of my ideas for us to pursue is an ongoing research project on what colors of what item where in what item number box. I don't believe it to be as daunting a task as it may seem if we take it one small step at a time. I think we can take an item with only two or three different numbers and two or three variations such as the Cathedral and research it. Then another item of the same size until we work up to items such as the ranch houses and Cape Cods. I have even noticed differences in the contents of some boxes based on whether they have normal or bold type as the for the description of what is in the box.



A Trip to Plasticville

One thing that I did over the summer was to board the train to Plasticville in West Hillside New Jersey.

I've always wanted to go, as so many have told of the uniqueness of the city established in 1947 by H. Bachmann; this in a manner similar to the development of the famous Levittown.

The trip takes about 25 minutes from the station in NYC and it is a pleasant ride.

The transition from the world of flesh to the world of plastic takes place some 15 minutes into the trip and is a very easy one to accept.

Before arrival at the Plasticville railroad center (#5608), the train passed through the lesser rival cities of Marx and Littleton New Jersey.

Upon arrival in Plasticville, I was greeted by some very helpful plastic people (#1605) and obtained the use of a rental car (#V-10) with which to explore the city.

The change in size to 1/48 was alright after a bit of adjusting, and so I was off.

I decided to get onto the main drag, "Bachmann Boulevard" and proceeded to the town hall (#PH-1) to get information on the town.

On the way from the post office (PO-1) and following the scenic Plasticville Guide I next made my way past the police station (#1614) on the way to the international airport (#5600) where I would make arrangements for my trip back.

After leaving the airport, I got a room at the motel (#1913) and then proceeded on to the diner (#1500) for a snack. After a decent meal, I got in the car and drove to the bank (#1801) in order to cash a few travelers' checks.

Now, I was set for the day's sightseeing. I did want to hit the Story Town Theme Park in which there was a castle (#5010), and displays of Humpty Dumpty (#5001), the

butcher the baker and the candlestick maker. Like Disneyworld, Storytown had a nice central area with a wishing well, a pail and Jack & Jill (#5012).

After that pleasant romp, I took off to the Plasticville Railroad center (# 5608) right near the community church (#1818). The turnpike (#5601) made the trip an easy one and I passed a large farm with a barn and animals (#BA-6). On the way out on Cowen Blvd, I passed a shopping center (#SP-8) and stopped to pick up a few things and I also stopped into the drugstore (#1611) for some aspirin.

The city is surrounded by scenic farmland and charming houses. It was a trip back in time to notice a few outhouses (# SA-7) here and there. The local TV station (#1618) was set out in the edges of the city near the secondary suburban railroad station (# 1616) with water tank (#1615).

The area was also home to several dairy farms (# 1623) with cattle loading pens (#1623) visible. The shade trees (#1628) provided a comfortable environment as I whizzed by telephone poles (#1000). I did see several houses for sale which caught my eye; those being a Cape Cod house (# 1502), a 2 story colonial (#1700), a colonial mansion (# 1983), and a ranch house (# 1934).

I made a quick pit stop (#1875) to fuel up at the gas station. Then I noticed a race track with a grandstand (#1876), sitting people (# 1877), and an official's stand (# 1878). I understand that they run the big Lionel cars sets there so I want to get to see a race sometime.

Next it was off to the airport admin. building (#AD-4) to check on the weather in the area. I noticed that there was an announcement for a train show at the local school house (# 1608) located a block or so from a quaint looking fire house with its two trucks (# 1921) in the driveway.

I returned to the motel and slept the night.

The next day, I planned to sightsee just a bit more before catching the Lionel 4:15 to New York.

The day was nice so I headed to a friend's house to have a barbecue (# 1004) feast. The house is a beauty with a spruce tree (#1001), rustic fence (#1007) in the back and picket fence (#1002) in the front. My friend has a small pond and bridge (#1300) in the yard, which only adds to the atmosphere.

After lunch, I left for the station platform (#1200), and since I had plenty of time, I stopped for an ice cream at Frosty Bar (#FB-1).

After dropping the car off at the agency, I looked a bit at the playground in sight and thought how nice this all was.

Naturally, I had not seen all of the things in historic Plasticville, but it was obvious that the place had many things to offer. I think that I'll join up in the Plasticville Collector Association out of Iowa. The city and town were that impressive.


